

Member Protection Policy

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 Responsibility: Netball Australia Board
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1. Introduction

- 1.1. Netball's vision is that "everyone in Australia values their connection with netball". Netball Australia and its Member Organisations will know when this vision is achieved when everyone in Australia has an opportunity to be involved in netball in a way that brings them good health, recognition, achievement, enjoyment and a sense of belonging.
- 1.2. Integrity in netball encompasses all of the elements needed to preserve what is intrinsically valuable about netball and to uphold the principles of fairness, respect, responsibility and safety. The main elements include the Netball Australia Anti-Doping Policy, National Policy on Match Fixing in Netball, Member Protection Policy and Integrity in Netball Framework and associated Rules: Anti-Illicit Drugs in Netball Rule, Supplements in Netball Rule, Medications in Netball Rule, No Self-Injection in Netball Rule, Anti-Doping Declaration Rule, and Reporting Conduct That May Bring Netball into Disrepute Rule.
- 1.3. This Policy is applicable for Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates, with appropriate variations at State/Territory, association and club levels.

2. Purpose of This Policy

- 2.1. This Policy aims to ensure the core values, good reputation, positive behaviours and attitudes of Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates are maintained and enhanced.
- 2.2. This Policy assists Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates to ensure that every person involved in netball is treated with respect and dignity, and is protected from discrimination, harassment and abuse. This Policy also ensures that everyone involved in netball is aware of her/his legal and ethical rights and responsibilities as well as the standards of behaviour expected of them.
- 2.3. This Policy also reflects netball's support of the sport industry principles and values outlined in *The Essence of Australian Sport* – principles of fairness, respect, responsibility and safety.
- 2.4. This Policy is accompanied by attachments that describe the practical steps Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will take to reduce discrimination, harassment, child abuse and other forms of inappropriate behaviour from netball. As part of this commitment, Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will take disciplinary action against any person or organisation bound by this Policy if they breach it.
- 2.5. The Netball Australia Board of Directors ("Board") has adopted this Policy in accordance with Rule 35.1 of the Netball Australia Constitution.
- 2.6. This Policy is effective from 1 January 2014 and will operate until replaced. This Policy may be amended from time to time by the Netball Australia Board.
- 2.7. This Policy is supported by Member Protection procedures that have been adopted, apply and are implemented by Member Organisation and their Affiliates (associations and clubs).
- 2.8. This Policy and accompanying documents can be obtained from the Netball Australia website - www.netball.asn.au or by contacting Member Organisations.

3. Who Does This Policy Apply To?

- 3.1. This Policy applies to the following people whether they are operating in a paid or unpaid/voluntary capacity in Netball Australia or with a Member Organisation or Affiliate:
 - 3.1.1. Member Organisations.
 - 3.1.2. Affiliates (including associations and clubs).
 - 3.1.3. Individual Members, including service award holders and life members.
 - 3.1.4. Individuals sitting on boards, committees and sub-committees.
 - 3.1.5. Employees and volunteers.
 - 3.1.6. Support personnel (e.g. managers, physiotherapists, psychologists, masseurs, sport trainers).
 - 3.1.7. Coaches and assistant coaches.
 - 3.1.8. Athletes and players.
 - 3.1.9. Umpires, bench officials and other officials.
 - 3.1.10. Peak associations and the national body.
 - 3.1.11. Any other person or organisation that is a member of or affiliated to Netball Australia.
 - 3.1.12. Parents, guardians, spectators and sponsors and any other person or organisation to the full extent that is possible.
 - 3.1.13. Members of the Players Association.
 - 3.1.14. Any other Person who has agreed to be bound by this Policy.
- 3.2. This Policy will continue to apply to a person even after they have stopped their association or employment with Netball Australia, Member Organisation or Affiliates if disciplinary action, against that person, has commenced.

4. Organisational Responsibilities

- 4.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisations and Affiliates must:
 - 4.1.1. Adopt, implement and comply with this Policy and its regulations and attachments.
 - 4.1.2. Ensure that the Constitution, By-Laws, Rules, Policies or other documents include the necessary clauses for this Policy to be enforceable.
 - 4.1.3. Publish, distribute and otherwise promote this Policy and the consequences of any breach.
 - 4.1.4. Promote appropriate standards of conduct at all times.
 - 4.1.5. Deal with any breaches of, or complaints made, under this Policy in an impartial, sensitive, fair, timely and confidential manner.
 - 4.1.6. Apply this Policy consistently without fear or favour.
 - 4.1.7. Recognise and enforce any penalty imposed under this Policy.
 - 4.1.8. Endeavour to ensure that a copy of this Policy is available or accessible to all people and organisations to whom this Policy applies.

- 4.1.9. Appoint or have access to appropriately trained people to receive and handle complaints and allegations (e.g. Member Protection Information Officers - MPIO).
- 4.1.10. Monitor and review this Policy as required.

5. Individual Responsibilities

- 5.1. Individuals bound by this Policy are responsible for:
 - 5.1.1. Making themselves aware of the Policy and complying with the codes and standards of behaviour its sets out.
 - 5.1.2. Consenting to undergo screening as per the National Child Protection Regulation and/or relevant State/Territory Legislation if the person holds or applies for a role that involves regular unsupervised contact with people under the age of 18 years;
 - 5.1.3. Placing the safety and welfare of children above other considerations.
 - 5.1.4. Being accountable for their behaviour.
 - 5.1.5. Following the steps outlined in this Policy for making a complaint or reporting possible child abuse.
 - 5.1.6. Complying with any decisions and/or disciplinary measures imposed under this Policy.
 - 5.1.7. Co-operating to provide in a netball environment free of discrimination, child abuse and harassment.
 - 5.1.8. Understanding the possible consequences of breaching this Policy.
 - 5.1.9. Complying with all other requirements of this Policy.

6. Position Statement: Child Protection

- 6.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates are committed to the safety and wellbeing of all children and young people who participate in netball and access netball's services. Netball supports the rights of the child and will act at all times to ensure a child-safe environment is maintained.
- 6.2. Netball Australia, Member Organisation or Affiliates acknowledges the valuable contribution made by staff, members and volunteers and encourages their active participation in providing and maintaining a safe, fair and inclusive environment for all participants.

6.2.1. Identify and Analyse Risk of Harm

- 6.2.1.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation or Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will develop and implement a risk management strategy, including a review of existing child protection practices, to determine how child-safe netball is and to identify any additional steps netball can take to minimise and prevent the risk of harm to children because of the actions of an employee, volunteer or another person.

6.2.2. Develop Codes of Behaviour

- 6.2.2.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation or Affiliates will develop and promote codes of behaviours that sets out the conduct netball expects of adults when they deal and interact with children involved in netball,

especially those in the care of Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates.

6.2.2.2. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will develop and promote codes of behaviour that sets out the conduct appropriate between children.

6.2.2.3. These codes will clearly describe professional boundaries, ethical behaviour and unacceptable behaviour. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

6.2.3. Choose Suitable Employees and Volunteers

6.2.3.1. Netball Australia, the Member Organisations and Affiliates will each ensure that their organisation takes all reasonable steps to ensure that it engages the most suitable and appropriate people to work with children, especially those in positions that involve regular unsupervised contact with children. This may be achieved using a range of screening measures.

6.2.3.2. Netball Australia, the Member Organisations and Affiliates will ensure that working with children checks are conducted for all employees and volunteers who work with children, where an assessment is required by law.

6.2.3.3. If a criminal history report is obtained as part of their screening process, Netball Australia, the Member Organisations and Affiliates will handle this information confidentially and in accordance with relevant State/Territory requirements. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

6.2.4. Support, Train, Supervise and Enhance Performance

6.2.4.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisations, Affiliates and organisations (where applicable and relevant) bound by this Policy, will ensure that all volunteers and employees who work with children have ongoing supervision, support and training. The goal is to develop skills and capacity to enhance their performance so netball can maintain a child-safe netball environment.

6.2.5. Empower and Promote the Participation of Children

6.2.5.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will encourage junior participants to be involved in developing and maintaining a child-safe environment for netball.

6.2.6. Report and Respond Appropriately To Suspected Abuse and Neglect

6.2.6.1. Netball Australia and the organisations bound by this Policy will ensure that all volunteers and employees are able to identify and respond appropriately to children at risk of harm at that they are aware of their responsibilities under respective State/Territory laws to make a report if they suspect on reasonable grounds that a child has been or is being abused or neglected. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

6.2.6.2. Netball Australia requires that any child who is abused or anyone who reasonably suspects that a child has been or is being abused by someone within netball to report it immediately to the police or relevant government agency and the CEO of Netball Australia or the CEO of the relevant Member Organisation. Descriptions of the sorts of activity which may be abuse are in the Definitions to this Policy.

- 6.2.6.3. If any person believes that another person or organisation bound by this Policy is acting inappropriately towards a child, or is in breach of this Policy, s/he may make an internal complaint. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).
- 6.2.6.4. All allegations of child abuse will be dealt with promptly, seriously, sensitively and confidentially. A person will not be victimised for reporting an allegation of child abuse and the privacy of all persons concerned will be respected. Netball Australia's procedures for handling allegations of child abuse are outlined in the Attachments to this Policy).
- 6.2.6.5. If anyone bound by this Policy reasonably suspects that a child is being abused by her/his parent/s, they are advised to contact the relevant government department for youth, family and community services in their State/Territory.

7. Position Statement: Taking Images of Children

- 7.1. Images of children can be used inappropriately or illegally. Netball Australia requires every person and organisation bound by this Policy, wherever possible, to obtain permission from a child's parent/guardian before taking an image of a child that is not their own. They should make sure the parent/guardian understands how the image will be used.
- 7.2. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) also requires the privacy of others to be respected and disallows the use of camera phones, videos and cameras to be used inside changing areas, showers and toilets.
- 7.3. When using a photo of a child, Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will not name or identify the child, publish personal information such as residential address, email address or telephone numbers without the consent of the parent/guardian.
- 7.4. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will not provide information about a child's hobbies, interests, school, or the like as this information can be used by paedophiles or other persons to groom a child.
- 7.5. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will only use images of children that are relevant to netball and will ensure that they are suitably clothed in a manner that promotes participation in netball. Wherever possible, netball will seek permission from a child's parent/guardian before using the image.

8. Position Statement: Anti-Discrimination and Harassment

- 8.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates aims to provide a sporting environment where all those involved in netball activities are treated with dignity and respect.
- 8.2. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates recognise that people cannot participate, enjoy themselves or perform at their best if they are treated unfairly, discriminated against or harassed.
- 8.3. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates prohibit all forms of harassment and discrimination based on personal characteristics listed in the Definitions to this Policy. Discrimination and harassment are extremely distressing, offensive, humiliating

and/or threatening and create an uncomfortable and unpleasant environment. In most circumstances discrimination and harassment are against the law.

- 8.4. Descriptions of some of the types of behaviour that could be regarded as harassment or discrimination are provided in the Definitions of this Policy.
- 8.5. If any person feels they are being harassed or discriminated against by another person or organisation bound by this Policy, they may make an internal complain. In some circumstances they may also be able to make a complaint to an external organisation. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

9. Position Statement: Sexual Relationships

- 9.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) take the position that consensual sexual relationships (whether or not of a sexual nature) between coaches or officials or athlete support personnel and the adult athletes they engage with due to on-court netball involvement, while not necessarily of constituting Harassment, should be avoided as they can have harmful effects on the person involved, on other persons and on netball's public image.
- 9.2. These relationships can also be perceived to be exploitative due to the differences in authority, maturity, status and dependence between the athlete and coach, official, or athlete support personnel.
- 9.3. Given there is always a risk that the relative power of the coach, official or athlete support personnel has been a factor in the development of such relationships, the coach, official, or athlete support personnel at all levels should avoid them. In the event that a player attempts to initiate an intimate relationship, the coach, official, athlete support personnel must take personal responsibility for discouraging such approaches, explaining the ethical basis for such actions.
- 9.4. The law is always the minimum standard for behaviour within netball and therefore sex with a child is a criminal offence.

10. Position Statement: Pregnancy

- 10.1. Netball Australia has a distinct Pregnancy in Netball Policy. (Available on the Netball Australia website).
- 10.2. Netball Australia is committed to providing an inclusive sporting environment for pregnant women involved in netball. Netball Australia expects everyone who is bound by this Policy to treat pregnant women with dignity and respect and to remove any unreasonable barriers to participation in netball that disadvantage them. Netball Australia will not tolerate any unlawful discrimination or harassment against pregnant women or women who may become pregnant.
- 10.3. Descriptions of some of the types of behaviour that could be regarded as pregnancy discrimination or harassment are provided in the Definitions to this Policy.
- 10.4. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will take reasonable care to ensure the safety, health and well-being of pregnant women and their unborn children.
- 10.5. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates (where applicable and relevant) will advise pregnant women that there may be risks involved, and encourage them to obtain medical advice about those risks. Pregnant women should be aware that their own health and well-being, and that of their unborn children, are of utmost importance in their decision making about the extent and manner in which they participate in netball.

- 10.6. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates encourages all pregnant women to consult with their medical advisers, make themselves aware of the facts about pregnancy in sport, and ensure that they make informed decisions about participation in particular sporting activities, including netball.
- 10.7. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will only require pregnant women to sign a disclaimer if all other participants are required to sign one in similar circumstances. Women will not be required to undertake a pregnancy test.
- 10.8. If any person feels they are being harassed or discriminated against by another person or organisation bound by this Policy, she may make a complaint. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

11. Position Statement: Gender Identity

- 11.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates are committed to providing safe, fair and inclusive netball environments where people from all backgrounds can contribute and participate.
- 11.2. People who identify as transgender or transsexual should be treated fairly and with dignity and respect at all times. This includes acting with sensitivity when a person is undergoing gender transition. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will not tolerate any unlawful discrimination or harassment against a person who identifies as transgender or transsexual or who is thought to be transgender or transsexual.
- 11.3. Descriptions of some of the types of behaviour that could be regarded as transgender or transsexual discrimination or harassment are provided in the Definitions to this Policy
- 11.4. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates recognise that the exclusion of transgender or transsexual people from participation in netball has significant implications for their health, well-being and involvement in community life. In general Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will support their participation in netball on the basis of the gender with which they identify.
- 11.5. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates also recognise there is debate over whether a male to female transgender person obtains any physical advantage over other female participants. This debate is reflected in the divergent discrimination laws across the country. If issues of performance advantage arise, Netball Australia will seek advice on the application of those laws in the particular circumstances.
- 11.6. Netball Australia notes that drug testing procedures and prohibitions also apply to people who identify as transgender or transsexual. A person receiving treatment involving a prohibited substance or method, as described on the World Anti-Doping Agency's Prohibited List, should apply for a Therapeutic Use Exemption.
- 11.7. If any person feels they are being harassed or discriminated against by another person or organisation bound by this Policy, they may make a complaint. (Refer to Attachments in this Policy).

12. Position Statement: Responsible Service and Consumption of Alcohol

- 12.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates are committed to conducting netball and social events and activities in a manner that encourages responsible service and consumption of alcohol.
- 12.2. As outlined in the Netball Australia Alcohol Code of Conduct, Netball Australia will:

- 12.2.1. Not allow individuals to participate in any sporting activities expressly sanctioned by Netball Australia if they are consuming alcohol or under the influence of alcohol.
- 12.2.2. Not encourage the promotion or service of alcohol in and around competition areas at underage events expressly sanctioned by Netball Australia.
- 12.2.3. Use its best endeavours to ensure that food and low alcohol and non-alcoholic drinks are available at any activity held or expressly sanctioned by Netball Australia where alcohol will be served.
- 12.2.4. Encourage responsible alcohol practices as well as being mutually supportive of individuals covered by this code of conduct, including providing support for individuals seeking assistance on alcohol related matters.

13. Position Statement: Smoking

- 13.1. Netball Australia recommends that the following principles should be applied to all netball events:
 - 13.1.1. No smoking shall occur at or near any sporting event or competition involving persons under the age of 18. This shall apply to coaches, players, trainers, officials and volunteers.
 - 13.1.2. Social events shall be smoke free, with smoking permitted at designated outdoor smoking areas.
 - 13.1.3. Coaches, officials, volunteers and players will refrain from smoking and remain smoke free while involved in an official capacity for Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates, on and off the court.
 - 13.1.4. State/Territory Legislation should be adhered to concerning smoke-free environments and selling of cigarettes.

14. Position Statement: Cyber Bullying and Safety

- 14.1. Bullying and harassment in all forms is regarded by Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates as unacceptable in netball. Bullying has the potential to cause great anxiety and distress to the person targeted by hurtful or derogatory comments or statements.
- 14.2. New technologies and communication tools, such as smart phones and social networking websites, have greatly increased the potential for people to be bullied through unwanted and inappropriate comments.
- 14.3. Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates will not tolerate abusive, discriminatory, intimidating or offensive statements being made online. In some cases, bullying is a criminal offence punishable.
- 14.4. Frustration at an umpire, official, teammate, coach or sporting body should never be communicated on social networking websites. These issues should instead be addressed – in a written or verbal statement or a complaint – to the relevant Affiliate, Member Organisation or Netball Australia.

15. Position Statement: Social Networking Websites

- 15.1. Netball Australia acknowledges the enormous value of social networking websites, such as Facebook and Twitter, to promote netball and celebrate the achievements and success of the people involved in netball.
- 15.2. Netball Australia expects all people bound by this Policy to conduct themselves appropriately when using social networking sites to share information related to netball.
- 15.3. Social media postings, blogs, status updates and tweets:
 - 15.3.1. Must not use offensive, provocative or hateful language.
 - 15.3.2. Must not be misleading, false or injure the reputation of another person.
 - 15.3.3. Should respect and maintain the privacy of others.
 - 15.3.4. Should promote netball in a positive way.

16. Complaints Procedures

16.1. Handling Complaints

- 16.1.1. Netball Australia aims to provide an easy to use, confidential and trustworthy procedure for complaints based on the principles of natural justice.
- 16.1.2. Any person (complainant) may report a complaint about a person, people, or organisation bound by this Policy (respondent) if they feel they have been harassed, bullied or discriminated against or there has been a breach of this Policy.
- 16.1.3. In the first instance, complaints should be reported to a Hearings Officer at the most relevant Affiliate or Member Organisation or National level. The Hearings Officer may refer a complainant to a MPIO for support and/or information.
- 16.1.4. Where a complaint relates to behaviour or an incident that occurred at the State/Territory level, or involves people operating at the State/Territory level, then the complaint should be reported to and handled by the relevant Member Organisation in the first instance
- 16.1.5. Where a complaint relates to behaviour or an incident that occurred at the club level, or involves people operating at the club level, then the complaint should be reported to and handled by the relevant club in the first instance.
- 16.1.6. Only matters that relate to, or which occurred at, the national level, as well as serious cases referred from Member Organisations or Affiliates, will be dealt with by Netball Australia.
- 16.1.7. A complaint may be handled informally or formally. The complainant will usually indicate her/his preferred option unless the Hearings Officer, MPIO or relevant official considers that the complaint falls outside this Policy and should be handled another way. For example, the law may require that the complaint/allegation be reported to an appropriate authority.
- 16.1.8. All complaints will be dealt with promptly, seriously, sensitively and confidentially. Netball Australia's procedures for handling and resolving complaints are outlined in the relevant Attachment.
- 16.1.9. Individuals and organisations may also seek to have their complaint handled by an external agency under anti-discrimination, child protection, criminal or other relevant legislation.

16.2. Improper Complaints & Victimisation

- 16.2.1. Netball Australia will provide a complaints procedure that has integrity and is free of unfair repercussions or victimisation gains' the person making the complaint.
- 16.2.2. Netball Australia will also take all necessary steps to make sure that people involved in a complaint are not victimised by anyone for coming forward with a complaint or for helping to sort it out. Disciplinary measures can be imposed on anyone who victimises another person for making a complaint or supporting another person's complaint.
- 16.2.3. If at any point in the complaint process the Hearings Officer considers that a complainant has knowingly made an untrue complaint or the complaint is vexatious or malicious or intended to cause distress to the respondent, the matter may be referred to a hearings tribunal for review and appropriate action which may include disciplinary action against the complainant.

16.3. Mediation

- 16.3.1. Netball Australia aims to resolve complaints in a timely and efficient manner. In many cases, complaints can be resolved by agreement between the people involved with no need for disciplinary action. The people involved in a formal complaint - the complainant and the person complained about (respondent) - may also seek the assistance of a neutral third person or a Mediator. Lawyers are not able to negotiate on behalf of the complainant and/or respondent.
- 16.3.2. Mediation is a confidential process that allows those involved in a complaint to discuss the issues or incident in question and come up with mutually agreed solutions. It may occur before or after the investigation of a complaint.
- 16.3.3. Mediation may occur either before or after an investigation of a complaint. If a complainant wishes to try and resolve the complaint with the assistance of a Mediator, the Hearings Officer will, in consultation with the complainant, arrange for a Mediator to mediate the complaint. More information on the mediation process is attached to this Policy.

16.4. Hearings Tribunals

- 16.4.1. A hearings tribunal may be formed to hear a formal complaint that has been referred by the Hearings Officer for an alleged breach of this Policy. Netball Australia's hearings procedure is attached to this Policy.
- 16.4.2. A respondent may lodge one appeal only to the appeal tribunal in respect of a decision of a hearing tribunal. The decision of the appeal tribunal is final and binding on the people involved in the appeal. Netball Australia's appeals process, including criteria for appeals is attached to this Policy.
- 16.4.3. Every organisation bound by this Policy will recognise and enforce any decision made, and form of discipline imposed, by a hearings or appeals tribunal under this Policy.
- 16.4.4. Members of hearing and appeal tribunals will be indemnified by the organisation that appointed them against any claim for loss, compensation or damages, and for costs incurred defending a claim made against them, because of their function as a member of a hearings or appeals tribunal.

17. What is a Breach of This Policy?

- 17.1. It is a breach of this Policy for any person or organisation bound by this Policy to do anything contrary to this Policy, including but not limited to:
 - 17.1.1. Acting in a manner contrary to this Policy, including breaching the attached Codes of Behaviour.
 - 17.1.2. Bringing netball, Netball Australia, Member Organisations or Affiliates into disrepute, or acting in a manner likely to bring the Netball Australia, Member Organisations or Affiliates into disrepute.
 - 17.1.3. Failing to follow Netball Australia, Member Organisations or Affiliates policies (including this Policy) and procedures for the protection, safety and well-being of children.
 - 17.1.4. Discriminating against, harassing or bullying (including cyber-bullying) any person.
 - 17.1.5. Victimising another person for making or supporting a complaint.
 - 17.1.6. Engaging in a sexually inappropriate relationship with a person that s/he supervises, or has influence, authority or power over.
 - 17.1.7. Verbally or physically assaulting another person, intimidating another person or creating a hostile environment within netball.
 - 17.1.8. Appointing or continuing to appoint a person to a role that involves working with children and young people contrary to this Policy.
 - 17.1.9. Disclosing to any unauthorised person or organisation any Netball Australia, Member Organisations or Affiliates information that is of a private, confidential or privileged nature.
 - 17.1.10. Making a complaint that they know to be untrue, vexatious, malicious or improper.
 - 17.1.11. Failing to comply with a penalty imposed after a finding that the individual or organisation has breached this Policy.
 - 17.1.12. Failing to comply with a direction given to the individual or organisation as part of a disciplinary process.

18. Disciplinary Measures

- 18.1. Netball Australia, Member Organisations or Affiliates may impose disciplinary measures on an individual or organisation for a breach of this Policy.
- 18.2. Any disciplinary measure imposed will be:
 - 18.2.1. Fair and reasonable.
 - 18.2.2. Applied consistent with any contractual and employment rules and requirements.
 - 18.2.3. Be based on the evidence and information presented and the seriousness of the breach.
 - 18.2.4. Be determined in accordance with netball's Constitution, By-laws, this Policy and/or the rules of the netball.

18.3. Individual

- 18.3.1. Subject to contractual and employment requirements, if a finding is made by a Tribunal that an individual has breached this Policy, one or more of the following forms of discipline may be imposed:
- 18.3.1.1. A direction that the individual make a verbal and/or written apology.
 - 18.3.1.2. A written warning.
 - 18.3.1.3. A direction that the individual attend counselling to address their behaviour.
 - 18.3.1.4. A withdrawal of any awards, scholarships, placings, records, achievements bestowed in any tournaments, activities or events held or sanctioned by Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates.
 - 18.3.1.5. A demotion or transfer of the individual to another location, role or activity.
 - 18.3.1.6. A suspension of the individual's membership or participation or engagement in a role or activity.
 - 18.3.1.7. Termination of the individual's membership, appointment or engagement.
 - 18.3.1.8. A recommendation that Netball Australia, Member Organisation and Affiliates terminate the individual's membership, appointment or engagement.
 - 18.3.1.9. In the case of a coach or official, a direction that the relevant organisation de-register the accreditation of the coach or official for a period of time or permanently.
 - 18.3.1.10. A fine.
 - 18.3.1.11. Any other form of discipline that the Hearings Tribunal considers appropriate.

18.4. Organisation

- 18.4.1. If a finding is made that Netball Australia, a Member Organisation or an Affiliate has breached its own Member Protection Policy, one or more of the following forms of discipline may be imposed by the Hearings Tribunal:
- 18.4.1.1. A written warning.
 - 18.4.1.2. A fine.
 - 18.4.1.3. A direction that any rights, privileges and benefits provided to that organisation by the national body or other peak association be suspended for a specified period.
 - 18.4.1.4. A direction that Netball Australia, a Member Organisation or Affiliate cease to sanction events held by or under the auspices of that organisation.
 - 18.4.1.5. A recommendation to Netball Australia, a Member Organisation or Affiliate that the membership be suspended or terminated in accordance with the relevant constitution or rules.

- 18.4.1.6. Any other form of discipline that Netball Australia or the relevant Member Organisation considers to be reasonable and appropriate.

18.5. Factors to Consider

- 18.5.1. The form of discipline to be imposed on an individual or organisation will depend on factors such as:
 - 18.5.1.1. The nature and seriousness of the breach.
 - 18.5.1.2. If the person knew, or should have known, that the behaviour was a breach of this Policy.
 - 18.5.1.3. The person's level of contrition.
 - 18.5.1.4. The effect of the proposed disciplinary measures on the person including any personal, professional or financial consequences.
 - 18.5.1.5. If there have been any relevant prior warnings or disciplinary action.
 - 18.5.1.6. The ability to enforce discipline if the person is a parent or spectator (even if they are bound by the Policy).
 - 18.5.1.7. Any other mitigating circumstances.

19. Amendment and Interpretation

- 19.1. This Policy may be amended from time to time by Netball Australia.
- 19.2. Headings used in this Policy are for convenience only and shall not be deemed part of the substance of this Policy or to affect in any way the language of the provisions to which they refer.
- 19.3. Words in the singular include the plural and vice versa.
- 19.4. Reference to "including" and similar words are not words of limitation.
- 19.5. The Definitions shall be considered an integral part of this Policy.
- 19.6. The Attachments shall be considered an integral part of this Policy.
- 19.7. This Policy shall apply from its specified effective date.
- 19.8. A Person includes a body corporate.
- 19.9. Words importing a gender include any other gender.
- 19.10. A reference to a clause is a reference to a clause or subclause of this Policy.
- 19.11. Where a word or phrase is given a particular meaning, other parts of speech and grammatical forms of that word or phrase have corresponding meanings.
- 19.12. In the event any provision of this Policy is determined invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall not be affected. This Policy shall not fail because any part of this Policy is held invalid.
- 19.13. Except as otherwise stated herein, failure to exercise or enforce any right conferred by this Policy shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any such right nor operate so as to bar the exercise or enforcement thereof or of any other right on any other occasion.

20. Definitions

- 20.1. These Definitions set out the meaning of words used in this Policy and its attachments without limiting the ordinary and natural meaning of the words. State/Territory specific definitions and more detail on some of the words in this dictionary can be sourced from the relevant State/Territory child protection commissions or equal opportunity and anti-discrimination commissions.
- 20.2. Unless otherwise stated, words that are not defined in this Framework and Rules will have the same meaning as in Netball Australia's Constitution.

Abuse	Is a form of harassment and includes physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse, neglect and abuse of power. Examples of abusive behaviour include bullying, humiliation, verbal abuse and insults.
Advanced Coach	Representative, Talent Identification and State League level coaches, as amended and updated from time to time.
Affiliate Affiliated club	Means a region, district, association or club, howsoever described, whether incorporated, unincorporated or otherwise, which is a member of a Member Organisation.
Athlete	Any Person who competes in netball as defined in the Netball Australia Athlete Classification Framework, or ANZ Championship (Australian based teams), or Australian Netball League, or National Netball Championship, or the State/Territory level as defined by each Member Organisation. Netball Australia and Member Organisations have the discretion to apply this Framework and Rules to any Person, and thus to bring them within the definition of "Athlete."
Athlete and Team Support Personnel	Manager, Doctor, Physiotherapist, Massage Therapist, Soft Tissue Therapist, Performance Analyst, Nutritionist, Psychologist, Strength and Conditioning role, Scientist, Para-Medical, Physiologist, Trainer, Recovery role or other personnel working with, treating or assisting an Athlete preparing for or participating in netball.
Australian Netball League	The competition between Member Organisation State/Territory League competitions and the ANZ Championship, and any subsequent or successor competition.
Authorised Netball Provider	Netball Australia, Member Organisations, Affiliates, ANZ Championship or other organisations from time to time, for example the Australian Commonwealth Games Association and International Netball Federation.
Child	Means a person who is under the age of 18.
Child abuse	Involves conduct which puts a child at risk of harm and may include: physical abuse , by hurting a child or a child's development (e.g. hitting, shaking or other physical harm; giving a child alcohol or

	<p>drugs; or training that exceeds the child’s development or maturity)</p> <p>sexual abuse by adults or other children, where a child is encouraged or forced to watch or engage in sexual activity or where a child is subject to any other inappropriate conduct of a sexual nature (e.g. sexual intercourse, masturbation, oral sex, pornography, including child pornography, or inappropriate touching or conversations)</p> <p>emotional abuse, by ill-treating a child (e.g. humiliation, taunting, sarcasm, yelling, negative criticism, name-calling, ignoring or placing unrealistic expectations on a child)</p> <p>neglect (e.g. failing to give a child food, water, shelter or clothing or to protect a child from danger or foreseeable risk of harm or injury).</p>
Coaches	As described in Netball’s Coach Education Framework as amended and updated from time to time. Tiers include Advanced Coach, Elite Coach and High Performance Coach.
Codes of Behaviour	Netball Australia’s Codes of Behaviour as amended from time to time.
Complainant	Means the person making a complaint.
Complaint	Means a complaint made under Clause 16 of this Policy.
Complaint handler/manager	Means the person appointed under this Policy to investigate a complaint.
Conduct that may bring netball into disrepute	Conduct that is dishonest, fraudulent, corrupt, illegal, unethical, improper, unsafe and conduct that may cause financial or reputational loss.
Developing International Athlete (DI)	<p>Netball Australia Athlete Classification Category 3 as amended and updated from time to time:</p> <p>Member of the Australian 21/U Squad/Team capable of reaching WC and/or IC Athlete status within 1-3 years.</p> <p>Nationally identified Athlete with the potential to progress to WC and/or IC Athlete status within 1 – 3 years.</p> <p>Netball Australia status: Australian 21/U Squad / Team or emerging talent.</p>
Discrimination	<p>Occurs when someone is treated unfairly or less favourably than another person in the same or similar circumstances because of a particular personal characteristic. This is known as direct discrimination. Indirect discrimination occurs when a rule, policy or practice disadvantages one group of people in comparison with others, even though it appears to treat all people the same.</p> <p>In Australia, it is against the law to discriminate against someone because of their:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • age • disability

Employee Personnel	Any Person or Persons employed by or contracted to Netball Australia or Member Organisations or ANZ Championship (Australian based office) or Affiliate.
Harassment	<p>Is any type of behaviour that the other person does not want and is likely to make the person feel intimidated, insulted or humiliated. Unlawful harassment can target a person because of their race, sex, pregnancy, marital status, sexual orientation or some other personal characteristic protected by law (see the list under “Discrimination”).</p> <p>Public acts of racial hatred which are reasonably likely to offend, insult, humiliate or intimidate are also prohibited. This applies to spectators, participants or any other person who engages in such an act in public. Some States/Territories also prohibit public acts that</p>

	vilify people on other grounds such as homosexuality, gender identity, HIV/AIDS, religion and disability (see also “Vilification”).
Hearings Officer	Means a person appointed by an organisation who is responsible for the administration of hearings by the hearings tribunal.
High Performance Coach	Australian Netball Diamonds, ANZ Championship, Australian Netball League, State/Territory, and top level State League coaches, as amended and updated from time to time.
Individual Member	Means a registered financial individual member of a Member Organisation or Affiliate (as the case may be).
International Class Athlete (IC)	Netball Australia Athlete Classification Category 2 as amended and updated from time to time: Member of the Diamonds National Squad and/or Team competing at international level in benchmark and/or other INF recognised international events and capable of maintaining this level of performance. Netball Australia status: Australian Netball Diamonds Squad/Team.
Junior	Means a person under the age of eighteen (18) years who is participating in an activity of the Netball Australia.
Mediator	Means an impartial person appointed to help those people involved in a complaint to talk through the issues and resolve the matter on mutually agreeable terms.
Mediator	Means a person appointed to mediate complaints made under this Policy. It is preferable that the mediator has relevant skills, qualifications and/or training in mediation.
Member	Means a member for the time being of Netball Australia under Part III of the Netball Australia Constitution and includes Member Organisations, Affiliates, Individual Members and Service Award Holders.
Member Organisations	The entity which is the official representative of and controlling authority for, Netball in a State. The current Member Organisations are: Australian Capital Territory Netball (ABN 85 800 220 698), Netball New South Wales (ABN 19 001 685 007), Northern Territory Netball (ABN 73 772 881 978), Netball Queensland (ABN 58 429 487 881), Netball South Australia (ABN 12 814 437 874), Netball Tasmania (ABN 62 028 131 759), Netball Victoria (ABN 83 704 752 745), and Netball Western Australia (ABN 36 657 982 648), as amended from time to time.
Member Protection	Is a term used by the Australian sport industry to describe the practices and procedures that protect members – both individual members such as players, coaches and officials, and the member organisations such as clubs, State/Territory associations, other affiliated associations and the national body. Member protection

	<p>involves:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • protecting those that are involved in sport activities from harassment, abuse, discrimination and other forms of inappropriate behaviour • adopting appropriate measures to ensure the right people are involved in an organisation, particularly in relation to those involved with juniors, and • providing education.
Member Protection Information Officer (MPIO)	Means a person trained to be the first point of contact for a person reporting a complaint under, or a breach of, this Policy. He or she provides impartial and confidential support to the person making the complaint.
National Child Protection Regulation	Means the specific requirements and/or processes that must be followed in a specific State or Territory in regards to child protection requirements. Where specific State legislation does not exist, the national requirements must be followed.
National Complaint Handling Regulation	Means the national complaints, tribunal, investigation and mediation processes which must be followed by all Member Organisations and Affiliates.
National Netball Championships	21/Under, 19/Under and 17/Under age based national competition conducted over a week between States/Territories.
Natural justice (or procedural fairness)	<p>Requires that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • both the complainant and the respondent must know the full details of what is being said against them and have the opportunity to respond • all relevant submissions must be considered • no person may judge their own case • the decision-maker(s) must be unbiased, fair and just • the penalties imposed must be fair.

Victimisation	Means subjecting a person, or threatening to subject a person, to any unfair treatment because that person has or intends to pursue their right to make any complaint, including a complaint under government legislation (e.g. anti-discrimination) or under this Policy, or for supporting another person to make complaint.
Vilification	Involves a person or an organisation doing public acts to incite hatred towards, serious contempt for, or severe ridicule of a person or group of people having any of the characteristics listed under the definition of “Discrimination”.
World Class Athlete (WC)	<p>Netball Australia Athlete Classification Category 1 as amended and updated from time to time:</p> <p>Member of the Diamonds National Squad and/or Team competing at international level in benchmark and/or other INF recognised international events and capable of maintaining this level of performance.</p> <p>Netball Australia status: Australian Netball Diamonds Squad/Team.</p>
Young People/person	Means people in the 13 – 18 year age group.
